Ant.</p> <p>2 Q. We heard in pen portraits about Anthony's childhood,</p> <p>3 growing up in Hull, and about how he moved to London in</p> <p>4 2010. That's right, isn't it?</p> <p>5 A. Yes.</p> <p>6 Q. I think it is right to say you had very frequent contact</p> <p>7 with Anthony after he moved down to London --</p> <p>8 A. Yes.</p> <p>9 Q. -- at that time?</p> <p>10 How did you in the main keep in touch with him?</p> <p>11 A. He always texted me and it was always the same, it was</p> <p>12 always, "Ring me, Sezza" and I said to him, "Just once</p> <p>13 you call me".</p> <p>14 Q. You called him Ant, he called you?</p> <p>15 A. Sezza.</p> <p>16 Q. Give us an idea of how frequently you were speaking or</p> <p>17 texting with Anthony?</p> <p>18 A. It was literally about every two days. If I was busy</p> <p>19 and it was three days and he hadn't spoken to me, he</p> <p>20 would just text me, "Are you dead, Sezza? What is up?</p> <p>21 What is going on?" Sometimes we was on the phone</p> <p>22 an hour and a half, you know, he would just waffle about</p> <p>23 nothing.</p> <p>24 Q. Yes.</p> <p>25 A. And I would be, "I am busy", you know.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 3</p>
<p>1</p> <p>2 (10.04 am)</p> <p>3 (In the presence of the jury)</p> <p>4 THE CORONER: Good morning, members of the jury.</p> <p>5 Yes, Mr O'Connor.</p> <p>6 MR O'CONNOR: Madam, may we please call Sarah Sak.</p> <p>7 MS SARAH SAK (sworn)</p> <p>8 Questions from MR O'CONNOR</p> <p>9 MR O'CONNOR: Do take a seat.</p> <p>10 Mrs Sak, the jury of course have heard from you</p> <p>11 already. You are Sarah Sak, Anthony's mother?</p> <p>12 A. Yes.</p> <p>13 Q. It was over two weeks ago now that you read out your pen</p> <p>14 portrait while we all listened and you told us about</p> <p>15 Anthony, your boy, as you described him.</p> <p>16 A. Yes.</p> <p>17 Q. I know you have been in court many of the days since</p> <p>18 when we have heard all about the investigation into</p> <p>19 Anthony's death.</p> <p>20 A. Hmm.</p> <p>21 Q. We have probably used Anthony's name hundreds of times</p> <p>22 but, of course, as you told us in your pen portrait,</p> <p>23 that was never a name you used for him?</p> <p>24 A. No.</p> <p>25 Q. What did you call him?</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 2</p>	<p>1 Q. So that is texting while you were up in Hull. Over</p> <p>2 those few years did you go down and see him in London</p> <p>3 sometimes?</p> <p>4 A. Yes, at least twice a year.</p> <p>5 Q. I think it is right to say that you last actually saw</p> <p>6 Anthony on one of those trips down to London?</p> <p>7 A. In the March.</p> <p>8 Q. In March 2014?</p> <p>9 A. Yes, it was my wedding anniversary.</p> <p>10 Q. Tell us?</p> <p>11 A. We went down to spend it with Anthony.</p> <p>12 Q. All right, and you went to see him where he was living</p> <p>13 in Golders Green at the time?</p> <p>14 A. Yes.</p> <p>15 Q. So that was the last time you saw him?</p> <p>16 A. Yes.</p> <p>17 Q. Then in terms of your last time you spoke to him before</p> <p>18 he died, I think that was on Sunday, 15 June, is that</p> <p>19 right?</p> <p>20 A. Yes.</p> <p>21 Q. Was that actually speaking to him or was it a text</p> <p>22 conversation?</p> <p>23 A. No, text conversation.</p> <p>24 Q. Of course you, as we will hear in a minute, were about</p> <p>25 to go abroad at that time, and was that largely the</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 4</p>

<p>1 subject of that text exchange?</p> <p>2 A. It was. It was that I hate flying and I said to him,</p> <p>3 you know where my life insurance policy is, sort of</p> <p>4 thing, it is to split between you and Paul, so he texted</p> <p>5 me, "Does Paul actually know how much it is for?" Yes,</p> <p>6 he does, you know, 50:50 sort of thing.</p> <p>7 Q. You were flying off to Turkey?</p> <p>8 A. Yes.</p> <p>9 Q. We will hear a bit more about that in a minute, but just</p> <p>10 to finish off this part of the story, we have heard that</p> <p>11 you were living in Hull, texting, speaking, going to see</p> <p>12 him in London. But it is right, I think, that actually</p> <p>13 you were planning to move to be closer to Anthony?</p> <p>14 A. Yes. I was due to come home the following Monday, off</p> <p>15 holiday and I was moving down there on the Friday.</p> <p>16 Q. Where were you going to move?</p> <p>17 A. I was going to move to Essex. I was -- I had</p> <p>18 transferred jobs, everything.</p> <p>19 Q. That was going to be a permanent move?</p> <p>20 A. Yes.</p> <p>21 Q. So that you could be closer to Anthony?</p> <p>22 A. Yes.</p> <p>23 Q. You said you had that exchange with Anthony on the</p> <p>24 Sunday, the 15th, and you flew off to Turkey the next</p> <p>25 day on the Monday?</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 5</p>	<p>1 Q. Did he tell you what the news was?</p> <p>2 A. In between sobs. He was absolutely heartbroken.</p> <p>3 Obviously he didn't know anything, he just said that</p> <p>4 Anthony had been found dead in the street.</p> <p>5 Q. Yes, so that was the Sunday. Then did you fly back</p> <p>6 home?</p> <p>7 A. I got the next flight, but it was a bit of a trains,</p> <p>8 planes and automobiles, because we had to travel hours</p> <p>9 across Turkey to the airport that we could get a flight</p> <p>10 from, then we were landed back in England at the wrong</p> <p>11 airport to pick my car up and, you know, it was quite</p> <p>12 a trek to get home, yes.</p> <p>13 Q. But you got home, after all of that, on the Monday of</p> <p>14 the next week?</p> <p>15 A. Yes.</p> <p>16 Q. No doubt you wanted to find out more about what had</p> <p>17 happened?</p> <p>18 A. Yes.</p> <p>19 Q. I think you refer in your statement to speaking to</p> <p>20 DS O'Donnell, of course, who the jury have heard from.</p> <p>21 A. Yes.</p> <p>22 Q. Did you actually have his number, maybe Paul gave it to</p> <p>23 you?</p> <p>24 A. No, my sister, I went straight to my sister's house,</p> <p>25 because she just had a list of policeman's phone</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 7</p>
<p>1 A. Yes.</p> <p>2 Q. Of course the jury and you have heard a lot of evidence</p> <p>3 about what happened in that week. We know that Anthony</p> <p>4 went to Barking on the Tuesday evening. We have heard</p> <p>5 about his body being found on the Thursday, post mortem</p> <p>6 on the Friday and all of those things.</p> <p>7 To fill in your part of this story, you were in</p> <p>8 Turkey at that time?</p> <p>9 A. Yes.</p> <p>10 Q. Did you actually know about any of this while it was</p> <p>11 happening?</p> <p>12 A. No, I had turned my phone off, because I use it for work</p> <p>13 as well and so I had turned it off and it just happened</p> <p>14 to be the Sunday night while my husband was getting</p> <p>15 a shower and we were getting ready to turn it out,</p> <p>16 I turned it on.</p> <p>17 Q. This is now Sunday, 22 June, the weekend after Anthony's</p> <p>18 body was found. You turned the phone back on and we</p> <p>19 have all been in a situation where you turn the phone on</p> <p>20 and --</p> <p>21 A. There must have been 50-odd messages, texts, all sorts.</p> <p>22 Obviously I phoned my family saying get in touch, get in</p> <p>23 touch.</p> <p>24 Q. Did you speak to your other son, Paul?</p> <p>25 A. Yes, I rang my son Paul.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 6</p>	<p>1 numbers, contact numbers, and his just happened to be at</p> <p>2 the top.</p> <p>3 Q. I see, so did you ring him?</p> <p>4 A. Yes.</p> <p>5 Q. What do you remember about that conversation?</p> <p>6 A. I explained who I was and said that, you know, I had</p> <p>7 just arrived back at the UK and, you know, can you tell</p> <p>8 me what has happened. So he just quite bluntly turned</p> <p>9 round and said well Anthony was found dead in the</p> <p>10 street. It is unusual, it is not suspicious. So</p> <p>11 I said, "Well, what do you mean it is unusual?" So he</p> <p>12 just said well, an FLO, he said Slaymaker, would be in</p> <p>13 touch with you and that was it. I was sort of holding</p> <p>14 the phone like oh, oh, okay. It was minutes.</p> <p>15 Q. Just minutes?</p> <p>16 A. Yes.</p> <p>17 Q. Did he actually say FLO, did you know what an FLO was at</p> <p>18 the time?</p> <p>19 A. Well, he said family liaison officer.</p> <p>20 Q. All right, and we have heard that DC Slaymaker had been</p> <p>21 appointed to be a family liaison officer by that stage?</p> <p>22 A. Hmm.</p> <p>23 Q. Did he take your phone number?</p> <p>24 A. No.</p> <p>25 Q. Did DC Slaymaker make touch with you later that day?</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 8</p>

<p>1 A. Yes.</p> <p>2 Q. Did he call you -- were you still at your sister's at</p> <p>3 this stage?</p> <p>4 A. No, I had gone back home by then.</p> <p>5 Q. So DC Slaymaker called you?</p> <p>6 A. Yes.</p> <p>7 Q. All right.</p> <p>8 I want to ask you a little bit about this</p> <p>9 conversation. But before I ask you, I think it will</p> <p>10 help if we all look together at the notes that</p> <p>11 DC Slaymaker made of the conversation and then I will</p> <p>12 come back and ask you more about it.</p> <p>13 Let's have up on screen, please, the jury --</p> <p>14 Mrs Sak, I think we have agreed that at least to start</p> <p>15 with, you will just look at these on screen, so you</p> <p>16 don't have to fumble around with the bundle. Of course</p> <p>17 if you want to go to the bundle we can find it. For the</p> <p>18 jury, it is tab 51, so it's the second volume of</p> <p>19 bundle B.</p> <p>20 It's IPC79, and if we can go to internal page 18,</p> <p>21 please.</p> <p>22 We see the date in the top left, 23rd, so that is</p> <p>23 the Monday, and the time is 8.20, does that roughly</p> <p>24 reflect what you think?</p> <p>25 A. Yes.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 9</p>	<p>1 on duty. I explained that I had liaised with Thomas</p> <p>2 [that's no doubt a reference to Anthony's father, who we</p> <p>3 will be hearing from also this morning]. I confirmed</p> <p>4 that she is happy for me to provide updates to Anthony's</p> <p>5 friends Kiera on the progress. Sarah's main concern at</p> <p>6 this time is when Anthony's body will be released so</p> <p>7 they can arrange for him to be brought back to Hull for</p> <p>8 the funeral. Sarah is not sure if she will travel down</p> <p>9 to London to view the body at present. I explained</p> <p>10 about the cremation act and she is not sure what she</p> <p>11 wants to do at present.</p> <p>12 "Sarah states her and Anthony were like best</p> <p>13 friends, they would talk most days on the phone and knew</p> <p>14 about what each other were doing. She was in the</p> <p>15 process of moving to Essex to be closer to him, as she</p> <p>16 only saw him a few times a year, the last time</p> <p>17 being March when she visited him.</p> <p>18 "Sarah states Anthony liked to drink and knew he</p> <p>19 would dabble in drugs, she thinks cocaine. Sarah states</p> <p>20 she knew he was gay and has know since he was 12 years</p> <p>21 old. Sarah said his dad didn't know about this. Sarah</p> <p>22 states China is his best friend. Sarah has spoken to</p> <p>23 her today. Sarah said China will help police with items</p> <p>24 in Anthony's flat. I asked Sarah if she had any</p> <p>25 questions she wanted answering and she wanted to know</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 11</p>
<p>1 Q. This goes on for a few pages, Mrs Sak, so just so the</p> <p>2 jury have it in mind I am going to read this through and</p> <p>3 then I am going to ask you about the conversation, all</p> <p>4 right? I hope I will be able to decipher the writing,</p> <p>5 I think most of it.</p> <p>6 What DC Slaymaker wrote is this:</p> <p>7 "I have spoken to Sarah Sak, Anthony's mother. She</p> <p>8 confirmed that she flew back into the country from</p> <p>9 Turkey this morning. I introduced myself and stated</p> <p>10 I would be her family liaison officer. I explained my</p> <p>11 role to her and she understood. I updated her, telling</p> <p>12 her that the special post mortem had been completed and</p> <p>13 we were awaiting results from the coroner's office.</p> <p>14 I stated I could not give her any timeframe at present,</p> <p>15 but I explained the coroner's process to her and that</p> <p>16 they would be making every attempt to release Anthony's</p> <p>17 body ASAP. I explained that we are treating Anthony's</p> <p>18 death as unexplained but not suspicious at this time and</p> <p>19 explained that we would be keeping her up to date on the</p> <p>20 progress. I provided her with a mobile phone number,</p> <p>21 landline number and explained [if we could go over to</p> <p>22 the next page, please] that I would email her so she can</p> <p>23 contact me if she has any questions. I explained that</p> <p>24 I am not on duty 24 hours, so if I did not answer,</p> <p>25 I would make every effort to contact her when I was back</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 10</p>	<p>1 how Anthony was identified and asked if it was by his</p> <p>2 teeth. I said I would find out and let her know.</p> <p>3 I said to Sarah if she is struggling to cope, she should</p> <p>4 book a doctor's appointment and I said I would send her</p> <p>5 a bereavement pack that may help her. She didn't have</p> <p>6 any further questions and was satisfied with what</p> <p>7 I explained. I stated I would let her know if there was</p> <p>8 any updates and would make attempts to call her next</p> <p>9 week. Sarah's email is [then he has written it down]</p> <p>10 I have sent Sarah a bereavement pack and a [something]</p> <p>11 who we are and what we do leaflet."</p> <p>12 That was the note that DC Slaymaker made about this</p> <p>13 meeting, Mrs Sak.</p> <p>14 I think there are at least two respects -- there may</p> <p>15 be more, but at least two respects which I am going to</p> <p>16 ask you about in which you think that note is not a full</p> <p>17 or not an accurate record of the conversation. The</p> <p>18 first point, and for this let's go back to page 20,</p> <p>19 please, we see there that DC Slaymaker has said, about</p> <p>20 four lines down:</p> <p>21 "Sarah states Anthony likes to drink and she knows</p> <p>22 he would dabble in drugs, she thinks cocaine."</p> <p>23 What do you say about that?</p> <p>24 A. That is an absolute lie. I never said that. Anthony,</p> <p>25 as far as I know, never did. I spoke to China and she</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 12</p>

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<p>1 told me that he had tried cannabis once. I absolutely</p> <p>2 never said that.</p> <p>3 Q. You said that very firmly. I mean obviously it was</p> <p>4 a long time ago, but you have a very clear view about</p> <p>5 that?</p> <p>6 A. Yes. I did say he liked to drink, because he did.</p> <p>7 Q. You mentioned China, Mrs Sak and the jury have seen her</p> <p>8 witness statement. Let's just very quickly have it up</p> <p>9 on screen, please. I don't think there is any need for</p> <p>10 the jury to turn it up in their bundles, it is IPC319.</p> <p>11 If we just look at the second page -- or the first</p> <p>12 page we can see the statement was made on 8 July, so two</p> <p>13 or three weeks after your conversation that we were just</p> <p>14 looking at. Then if we look at the second page, please,</p> <p>15 we see at the bottom -- do you see just the very last</p> <p>16 two lines:</p> <p>17 "On occasions, and only if it was at a party, he,</p> <p>18 [that is Anthony] would do some cocaine or ecstasy but</p> <p>19 wouldn't know where to get if from in London."</p> <p>20 So it does seem that about this time China was</p> <p>21 telling the police that he, Anthony, may occasionally</p> <p>22 have taken cocaine but you are quite sure, are you, that</p> <p>23 you didn't say to DC Slaymaker --</p> <p>24 A. No, absolutely not.</p> <p>25 Q. Let's have the notes back up, please, so IPC79.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 13</p>	<p>1 and I said to him on many occasions, "I am never going</p> <p>2 to shut up and I am never going away, Anthony was</p> <p>3 murdered". And I said that in that conversation there,</p> <p>4 and I said it the very first time I spoke to him, I said</p> <p>5 Anthony was murdered and I will never shut up and I will</p> <p>6 never go away and he said -- the same thing, he said it</p> <p>7 all the time. He was not murdered, you know, it is</p> <p>8 unexplained.</p> <p>9 And that -- he never mentioned that in there and</p> <p>10 that was the very first time I said it and I said it</p> <p>11 every single time that I spoke to him.</p> <p>12 Q. Yes, so just going back to -- you said he wasn't shot,</p> <p>13 he wasn't stabbed, what do you mean by that? You mean</p> <p>14 that if those things, if he was not shot or stabbed,</p> <p>15 then --</p> <p>16 A. How --</p> <p>17 Q. Go on?</p> <p>18 A. Well, I said to him was he beaten up? Was he shot? Was</p> <p>19 he stabbed? And he said, "No, there wasn't a mark on</p> <p>20 him". I said, "People don't just drop dead in the</p> <p>21 street and what was he doing in Barking?" Because we</p> <p>22 didn't know at the time.</p> <p>23 Q. Right, so --</p> <p>24 A. I had a lot more input in that conversation than he has</p> <p>25 put.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 15</p>
<p>1 Let's look at page 18. Towards the bottom, there,</p> <p>2 we see DC Slaymaker has recorded that he explained to</p> <p>3 you that they are treating Anthony's death as</p> <p>4 "unexplained but not suspicious".</p> <p>5 First of all, do you think he said something along</p> <p>6 those lines to you?</p> <p>7 A. Yes, I said to him, "Well, how come it is not</p> <p>8 suspicious? People don't just drop dead in the street".</p> <p>9 None of this is recorded on here, what I said, we had</p> <p>10 a long conversation. I said to him, "Was he shot? Was</p> <p>11 he stabbed? Was he beaten up? You don't just drop dead</p> <p>12 in the street". And he said to me it was probably</p> <p>13 drugs.</p> <p>14 So that is when I just really lost it with him,</p> <p>15 I was like you can't just say that, it could be</p> <p>16 anything, you know. Even from I think from that minute,</p> <p>17 the relationship went down before it even started.</p> <p>18 Q. Just explain a bit more. What was your reaction then to</p> <p>19 him just responding it was probably drugs?</p> <p>20 A. It was just, as though he had just written it off, there</p> <p>21 and then, that was it, it was drugs. This was like</p> <p>22 a week, obviously, nearly a week after Anthony had</p> <p>23 died --</p> <p>24 Q. Yes.</p> <p>25 A. -- but he just wouldn't listen to anything anybody said</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 14</p>	<p>1 Q. So not recorded is what you told him, your challenges?</p> <p>2 A. He said I was satisfied. I definitely wasn't.</p> <p>3 Q. What you have said in a different statement, in fact the</p> <p>4 statement you gave to Operation Lilford, Mrs Sak, I will</p> <p>5 just read out the sentence, you said:</p> <p>6 "I knew from the beginning that Anthony had been</p> <p>7 killed and no one listened."</p> <p>8 Is that right?</p> <p>9 A. Yes.</p> <p>10 Q. Is this the start then of what you --</p> <p>11 A. This was it, the very first conversation.</p> <p>12 Q. Yes.</p> <p>13 I want to move on and just look at a few more</p> <p>14 entries in this log and then, like last time, I will</p> <p>15 then ask you some more questions.</p> <p>16 Let's just go through and see what DC Slaymaker has</p> <p>17 entered. It is in the same document, let's go forward</p> <p>18 first to page 24, please. I think this is the next</p> <p>19 entry. We remember one of the references in that first</p> <p>20 conversation was to how Anthony was going to be</p> <p>21 identified and you asking about whether it was his</p> <p>22 teeth. Is that something that you did discuss?</p> <p>23 A. Yes, because he had very unique surgery on his mouth and</p> <p>24 on his teeth.</p> <p>25 Q. Yes, so this is I think -- we can just about see it is</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 16</p>

<p>1 24 June, so that would be the Tuesday of that week. If 2 that is right: 3 "I called Sarah at 6.20 in the evening. There was 4 no answer but she called me back. I answered her 5 question about ID, stating that Anthony was identified 6 by photographic documentation. It is possible he may 7 need to be formally IDed, but I would speak with the 8 coroner for guidance. Sarah said if it has to be 9 a usual ID she will do this as she does not want to put 10 his friends through it. She stated that he did have 11 a lot of work done on his teeth, this was initially at 12 Leeds Teaching Hospital, but recently he has been to 13 a hospital near King's Cross. I advised her that Kiera 14 has got a message on her answerphone to call me. Sarah 15 said she goes away on Friday for three weeks, but China 16 could be updated. I advised her I have emailed the 17 coroner and am awaiting an update." 18 That was obviously a conversation the next day, on 19 the Tuesday. 20 If we could just go forward to page 27, please. 21 This was then a few days later, it looks like the 28th, 22 so the Saturday: 23 "Sarah called me stating that she had seen on the 24 internet someone had been arrested in connection with 25 Anthony's death. I asked if I could get an update and</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 17</p>	<p>1 Q. Is that right? 2 A. Yes. 3 Q. That the first you knew that Stephen Port had been 4 arrested was seeing it on the internet? 5 A. Yes. 6 Q. How did you find it on the internet? 7 A. I think it was -- I am sure it was my other, my 8 ex-sister-in-law, Tom's sister, because we were all 9 looking, obviously, on the Barking and Dagenham Post and 10 things like that, and seeing what it is there and she 11 rang me and told me. 12 Q. How do you feel about the fact that this is how you 13 found out about this? 14 A. I was furious and I definitely wasn't satisfied. He 15 keeps putting it on the end of there. I don't think 16 there was ever a conversation that I was satisfied with. 17 Q. In a few sentences, what do you think you said to 18 DC Slaymaker on this occasion? 19 A. Probably something like, you know, really nice of you to 20 get back to us and let us know, we are having to read 21 this stuff in the paper. You know, or online. 22 Q. We see there is a record of you asking whether the 23 person who had been arrested was Joe, Joe Dean, who you 24 had obviously been told by that stage that there was 25 somebody called Joe Dean?</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 19</p>
<p>1 call her back. I had email on SIO update email to me by 2 DS Turrell. After a conversation with DS Turrell, 3 I provided Sarah with the following update. I explained 4 to her that a male has been arrested for perverting the 5 course of justice and stated that we have suspicion he 6 may have lied to us during enquiries. We needed to 7 establish this [something] on interview. He has now 8 been bailed pending further investigation and toxicology 9 reports. I explained we are still treating Anthony's 10 death as unexplained and still awaiting toxicology 11 results from the post mortem. She asked if this male 12 was Joe, the guy he was supposed to meet and I stated 13 I do not know that but it is possible. I explained 14 I would speak with the officer in the case [over the 15 page] and the SIO on Monday and see if they can provide 16 me with more of an update. And that I would call her 17 Monday either way. He goes on to say 20 that he discussed this with Debbie, who is a sergeant, 21 and he provided you with the following update.
