DI SCHAMBERGER: Not as far as I'm aware, no:

CORONER: The pathologist has also commented that it was recommended that further examination of the bed sheet, as well as positive confirmation of the handwriting, which you've confirmed, be obtained. Was that something that was done?

DI SCHAMBERGER: The bed sheet was not submitted for examination, no.
