I then                  6 walked over to the male lying on the grass to make sure                  7 he was okay. As I stood above this male for a few                  8 minutes I realised that he was not breathing as I could                  9 not see his chest rising and falling.                  10 "I then left this male and started to make my way                  11 towards the direction of Barking town centre to get some                  12 help. However, after a very short walk away from the                  13 male lying on the grass, I spotted two police officers.                  14 I think they may have been on bikes -- they were coming                  15 out of St Margaret's graveyard so I went straight over                  16 to them. Upon speaking to these two police officers                  17 I said to one of them, 'Do you want to have a look                  18 around the corner as there is a person lying there'.                  19 Both police officers then made the way to the male lying                  20 on the grass and I followed them back to that location                  21 and the male was still lying there on the grass in the                  22 same position. I didn't know this male was dead until                  23 the police told me -- I presumed he may have been drunk                  24 or unconscious.                  25 "I don't know this male and have never seen him</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 3</p>
<p>1 (9.01 am)                  2 (In the presence of the jury)                  3 THE CORONER: Good morning, members of the jury.                  4 Yes, Mr O'Connor.                  5 MR O'CONNOR: Madam, we have reached the stage of the                  6 evidence where we move forward to hear evidence relating                  7 to the investigation into the death of Jack Taylor.                  8 Statement of MR PAUL ELMES (read)                  9 MR O'CONNOR: I am going to start by reading a short                  10 statement by Mr Paul Elmes. The statement is dated                  11 18 February 2016, it is supported by the usual statement                  12 of truth. Mr Elmes gives his occupation as a civil                  13 servant and he refers to the fact that this statement is                  14 given in relation to a statement he made to the police                  15 on 14 September, where, as he put it, he came across                  16 a dead male body and he says that his details are known                  17 to the police.                  18 The statement reads as follows:                  19 "At present I am currently employed by the borough                  20 of Barking and Dagenham to work across a range of parks                  21 within the borough. I can confirm I have held this                  22 position for a number of years and was employed in the                  23 same capacity in 2014 and 2015.                  24 "On Monday, 14 September 2015, at around 12.50 pm,                  25 I was in Abbey ruins, Barking, London which is a small</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 2</p>	<p>1 before but would describe him as a young white male,                  2 late 20s to early 30s, he was wearing a shirt, blue                  3 jeans and a pair of shoes.                  4 "In terms of the position this male was lying in on                  5 the grass -- I would describe it as awkward position,                  6 one of his legs was straight and the other was bent over                  7 the other leg. His shirt was above his belly button and                  8 there was some sort of green liquid coming out his                  9 nose."                  10 Madam, that is the end of the statement of Mr Elmes,                  11 may we now call, please, Sergeant O'Donohue.                  12 MR JASON O'DONOHUE (affirmed)                  13 MR O'CONNOR: I have just been asked to pause for the                  14 transcribers. (Pause)                  15 Questions from MR O'CONNOR                  16 MR O'CONNOR: Could you give us your full name, please?                  17 <b>A. Jason Raymond O'Donohue.</b>                  18 Q. Mr O'Donohue, we can see you are a sergeant in the                  19 Metropolitan Police force?                  20 <b>A. Correct.</b>                  21 Q. I think it is the case that you joined the police in                  22 1989?                  23 <b>A. 1988, sir.</b>                  24 Q. 1988?                  25 <b>A. Yes, late 1988.</b></p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 4</p>

<p>1 Q. As a uniformed constable?</p> <p>2 <b>A. That's correct.</b></p> <p>3 Q. You have remained in uniform since that time?</p> <p>4 <b>A. That's correct, sir, yes.</b></p> <p>5 Q. Is it right that you were promoted to a sergeant in</p> <p>6 2004?</p> <p>7 <b>A. That's correct, sir.</b></p> <p>8 Q. That in fact remained your substantive rank, we will</p> <p>9 hear that you were acting up as an inspector, but you</p> <p>10 have remained a substantive sergeant since 2004?</p> <p>11 <b>A. That's correct, until I retired.</b></p> <p>12 Q. Tell us, you in fact retired when?</p> <p>13 <b>A. 2019, start of 2019.</b></p> <p>14 Q. All right, so you are obviously aware we are here to ask</p> <p>15 you questions about what happened in 2015 --</p> <p>16 <b>A. Of course.</b></p> <p>17 Q. -- so you had not retired at that time?</p> <p>18 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>19 Q. But you have retired since. So tell us why you are</p> <p>20 wearing that uniform today?</p> <p>21 <b>A. With Covid and lockdown, the kind of the call went out</b></p> <p>22 <b>for people to come back and essentially I answered the</b></p> <p>23 <b>call and I have come back on a part-time basis. Into my</b></p> <p>24 <b>old substantive rank, ma'am.</b></p> <p>25 Q. Just going back towards the time we are interested in.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 5</p>	<p>1 Before I come to those, let me ask you just about</p> <p>2 any involvement you may have had in the other deaths</p> <p>3 that this jury has heard about.</p> <p>4 <b>A. Okay.</b></p> <p>5 Q. First of all, we have heard evidence about the death of</p> <p>6 Anthony Walgate in June 2014.</p> <p>7 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>8 Q. His body was discovered in Cooke Street, were you</p> <p>9 involved at all in that case?</p> <p>10 <b>A. Not at all, sir, no.</b></p> <p>11 Q. Do you remember hearing anything about it, around the</p> <p>12 station or --</p> <p>13 <b>A. No, sir.</b></p> <p>14 Q. Moving forward, Gabriel Kovari's body was discovered in</p> <p>15 August 2014 and then subsequently Daniel Whitworth's</p> <p>16 body was discovered in September 2014.</p> <p>17 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>18 Q. Firstly, were you involved at all in the discovery of</p> <p>19 Gabriel Kovari's body?</p> <p>20 <b>A. No, sir.</b></p> <p>21 Q. A month later in September 2014, as I have said,</p> <p>22 Daniel Whitworth's body was found, holding a note which</p> <p>23 the jury have heard about.</p> <p>24 The jury heard from Inspector Joyce, who was the</p> <p>25 duty inspector on that day and attended the scene.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 7</p>
<p>1 I think it is right that you had moved to Barking and</p> <p>2 Dagenham borough in early 2012?</p> <p>3 <b>A. 2012, yes.</b></p> <p>4 Q. When I come to ask you questions about September 2015,</p> <p>5 by that stage you had been a police officer for over</p> <p>6 25 years and a sergeant for 11 years or so?</p> <p>7 <b>A. Correct.</b></p> <p>8 Q. And in Barking and Dagenham for three/three and a half</p> <p>9 years?</p> <p>10 <b>A. There or thereabouts, yes.</b></p> <p>11 Q. As I say, I am going to come to ask you questions about</p> <p>12 things that happened six or so years ago.</p> <p>13 Do you actually have a memory now of those events,</p> <p>14 Mr O'Donohue?</p> <p>15 <b>A. Bits and pieces, sir, yes.</b></p> <p>16 Q. As with others you made witness statements much closer</p> <p>17 to the time and we may well take you to those</p> <p>18 statements, also to those documents which were</p> <p>19 completed, again, much closer to the time.</p> <p>20 <b>A. I understand.</b></p> <p>21 Q. The main part of my questions, sergeant, will be about</p> <p>22 the events of September and October 2015 and</p> <p>23 investigations into the death of Jack Taylor?</p> <p>24 <b>A. Of course.</b></p> <p>25 Q. As you understand.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 6</p>	<p>1 I think it is right that you took over from him. He was</p> <p>2 the early turn inspector, were you the late turn</p> <p>3 inspector?</p> <p>4 <b>A. I was the late turn inspector on that day, yes.</b></p> <p>5 Q. On 20 September?</p> <p>6 <b>A. Yes, sir.</b></p> <p>7 Q. Again, the jury have heard that over that night, or sort</p> <p>8 of towards the end of the day on the 20th, over then to</p> <p>9 the night duty, going through to the Sunday, various</p> <p>10 investigations took place trying to investigate the note</p> <p>11 and in particular the reference to someone called</p> <p>12 Gabriel Kline on the note?</p> <p>13 <b>A. That's correct.</b></p> <p>14 Q. Do you recall having some involvement in those events?</p> <p>15 <b>A. I didn't at the time. As I am sure is a matter of</b></p> <p>16 <b>record I was under investigation by the IOPC and as such</b></p> <p>17 <b>was served thousands of pages of disclosure and then</b></p> <p>18 <b>I picked up in some of that disclosure that I had been</b></p> <p>19 <b>consulted or shown a note or liaised with, depending on</b></p> <p>20 <b>which document you looked at, which is my first</b></p> <p>21 <b>recollection or knowledge that I had touched on that in</b></p> <p>22 <b>any way, shape or form other than taking over on the</b></p> <p>23 <b>late turn on the day.</b></p> <p>24 Q. Yes. I am not going to take you to those documents. As</p> <p>25 you say, there are one or two references to you being</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 8</p>

<p>1 involved on that night?</p> <p>2 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>3 Q. Would it be fair, from what you are saying, that it is</p> <p>4 not something you remember now?</p> <p>5 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p>6 Q. Perhaps if you did have any involvement, it was a fairly</p> <p>7 passing matter?</p> <p>8 <b>A. Very, very minor, if any. As I say, you have seen my</b></p> <p>9 <b>statement, my level of involvement, even a couple of</b></p> <p>10 <b>years later -- or my level of memory around it, sorry,</b></p> <p>11 <b>I should say, even a couple of years later was</b></p> <p>12 <b>negligible.</b></p> <p>13 Q. Right. Let's turn then to look at your involvement in</p> <p>14 the events of September 2015 and if I can just set out</p> <p>15 the outline of it before we get into the detail. We</p> <p>16 have heard the statement from Mr Elmes, and it was</p> <p>17 14 September, which was a Monday --</p> <p>18 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>19 Q. -- that Jack Taylor's body was discovered. Were you the</p> <p>20 duty inspector on that day?</p> <p>21 <b>A. Yes, that's correct.</b></p> <p>22 Q. The jury have heard now quite a lot about the roles of a</p> <p>23 duty inspector, you were of course a substantive</p> <p>24 sergeant but you were acting up, were you?</p> <p>25 <b>A. I was temporarily promoted, yes.</b></p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 9</p>	<p>1 and so on?</p> <p>2 <b>A. I had two periods of leave, they were not holidays, they</b></p> <p>3 <b>were just two periods of leave.</b></p> <p>4 Q. Thank you, but there were moments during that month</p> <p>5 where you became involved or you were on duty and you</p> <p>6 took part in the investigation?</p> <p>7 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>8 Q. As I say, I will come to those later.</p> <p>9 <b>A. Okay.</b></p> <p>10 Q. Let's start though with the events of the 14th, the</p> <p>11 Monday. I think you have said that you were the early</p> <p>12 turn duty inspector on that day?</p> <p>13 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>14 Q. I think we have heard that would have involved starting</p> <p>15 at 7.00 in the morning?</p> <p>16 <b>A. Yes, that's correct.</b></p> <p>17 Q. Going through to what time in afternoon?</p> <p>18 <b>A. I think the responsibility hands over at 2.00 and then</b></p> <p>19 <b>you might be on duty till 3.00, I can't remember.</b></p> <p>20 Q. As we have heard from Mr Elmes, it was just after 1.00</p> <p>21 that he found Jack's body and was able to sort of flag</p> <p>22 down two police officers on bicycles, PCs Taylor and</p> <p>23 Holder and PC Taylor will be giving evidence later</p> <p>24 today, later this morning.</p> <p>25 <b>A. Okay.</b></p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 11</p>
<p>1 Q. Yes, so a temporary ...</p> <p>2 <b>A. Inspector.</b></p> <p>3 Q. Inspector. I am going to ask you about, of course,</p> <p>4 going to the scene, what you saw and the decisions you</p> <p>5 took there.</p> <p>6 <b>A. I understand.</b></p> <p>7 Q. As I say, just to get the times pan in mind, leaping</p> <p>8 forward, we know that it was actually a month later to</p> <p>9 the day, 14 October, when the connection was made,</p> <p>10 between -- or rather it was realised that Stephen Port</p> <p>11 had an involvement with Jack Taylor's death?</p> <p>12 <b>A. That's correct.</b></p> <p>13 Q. I will ask you about that in few minutes.</p> <p>14 <b>A. Okay.</b></p> <p>15 Q. That, of course, changed everything and a very different</p> <p>16 investigation then took over. Between those two dates,</p> <p>17 14 September and 14 October, is it right that, because</p> <p>18 you were the duty inspector on that day when Jack's body</p> <p>19 was discovered, you retained responsibility for the</p> <p>20 investigation?</p> <p>21 <b>A. That's correct.</b></p> <p>22 Q. During that month?</p> <p>23 <b>A. Yes, that is the policy.</b></p> <p>24 Q. Will we hear in fact that for a lot of that time you</p> <p>25 were not on duty, partly through holidays and rest days</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 10</p>	<p>1 Q. Let's have a look, please -- you have two bundles in</p> <p>2 front of you, Sergeant O'Donohue. I am going to ask the</p> <p>3 jury to look at the larger of those two bundles. The</p> <p>4 document will come up on screen though, so you have</p> <p>5 a choice of using the bundle or looking on the screen.</p> <p>6 It is behind tab 2.</p> <p>7 We are now looking, members of the jury, at</p> <p>8 bundle D. It is the Jack Taylor jury bundle.</p> <p>9 The jury are quite familiar with this document. It</p> <p>10 is a CAD, is it not?</p> <p>11 <b>A. That's correct, sir.</b></p> <p>12 Q. So the document that is generated when an emergency call</p> <p>13 is made. If we look at the first page, we can see, and</p> <p>14 this is consistent with what Mr Elmes's statement said,</p> <p>15 about four lines down -- sorry, for the screen it is</p> <p>16 IPC31.</p> <p>17 Do we see there, at the top, that it is 13.12, so</p> <p>18 1.12, that the CAD is triggered?</p> <p>19 <b>A. That's correct, sir, yes.</b></p> <p>20 Q. That would have been the time when the emergency call</p> <p>21 was made?</p> <p>22 <b>A. It would have been the time, yes.</b></p> <p>23 Q. Where were you, do you think, at around this time?</p> <p>24 <b>A. I was back in the control room, the Grip and PACE centre</b></p> <p>25 <b>as it is called, back at Fresh Wharf patrol base, it's</b></p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 12</p>

<p>1 <b>down by the north circular, the A13 there.</b></p> <p>2 Q. How did you become aware of this call?</p> <p>3 <b>A. I just heard a radio transmission from -- whether it was</b></p> <p>4 <b>Holder or Taylor, I don't know which number is which</b></p> <p>5 <b>officer, that they had found a body.</b></p> <p>6 Q. What did you do?</p> <p>7 <b>A. I made my way to the scene.</b></p> <p>8 Q. We have heard from -- you are now the fourth duty</p> <p>9 inspector that we have heard from. I think at least two</p> <p>10 of them went to the scene with a sergeant who was on</p> <p>11 duty with them. Did you go with the sergeant or --</p> <p>12 <b>A. No, so I had -- Sergeant Ben Tanner was on duty with me,</b></p> <p>13 <b>but he was busy at the time, I don't recall what with,</b></p> <p>14 <b>but he was in the room. I was basically, "You crack on</b></p> <p>15 <b>with what you are doing, I will go", and went on my own.</b></p> <p>16 Q. Can you turn over to page 4 of the document, please.</p> <p>17 By way of context, I think it is right that in each</p> <p>18 of the other three cases that the jury have heard about</p> <p>19 the London Ambulance Service attended, when the bodies</p> <p>20 of Anthony, Gabriel and Daniel were found.</p> <p>21 <b>A. Okay.</b></p> <p>22 Q. If we look at the top of page 4, here, we see some</p> <p>23 entries around the time, 13.15/13.16, and then at 13.19,</p> <p>24 there is an entry saying, "LAS not attending"?</p> <p>25 <b>A. That's correct.</b></p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 13</p>	<p>1 Q. In fact someone has written your name in next to it --</p> <p>2 <b>A. He has as well, sir, yes.</b></p> <p>3 Q. -- just for the avoidance of doubt.</p> <p>4 It has you arriving at 13.25 --</p> <p>5 <b>A. That's correct.</b></p> <p>6 Q. -- so within 10 or 12 minutes of the CAD starting and</p> <p>7 just to look, while we are looking at this document, we</p> <p>8 see it looks like you were there for an hour and</p> <p>9 a quarter or so, because it has you leaving at 14.41?</p> <p>10 <b>A. That sounds perfect, yes.</b></p> <p>11 Q. Thank you. We can take that down.</p> <p>12 Going back then to when you arrived at the scene,</p> <p>13 was the first thing that took place a briefing, did you</p> <p>14 ask PC Taylor or PC Holder or both of them to give you</p> <p>15 a briefing about what they found and what was going on?</p> <p>16 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>17 Q. Tell us something about that.</p> <p>18 <b>A. Can I see my statement?</b></p> <p>19 Q. Let me ask you.</p> <p>20 First of all, did you ask them about Jack, about</p> <p>21 whether they checked whether he was alive or what their</p> <p>22 views were about that?</p> <p>23 <b>A. I think -- as is quite clear, they had formed the</b></p> <p>24 <b>opinion that Jack had sadly passed.</b></p> <p>25 Q. Yes.</p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 15</p>
<p>1 Q. Were you aware of that development as it happened or did</p> <p>2 you become aware of the fact that the ambulance service</p> <p>3 were not going to attend the scene?</p> <p>4 <b>A. I was aware they wouldn't be coming, if CPR wasn't in</b></p> <p>5 <b>progress they won't come. They stopped doing that --</b></p> <p>6 <b>I can't remember when they doing that, but they stopped</b></p> <p>7 <b>attending unless CPR was going on.</b></p> <p>8 Q. We may hear more about that from PC Taylor when he gives</p> <p>9 evidence.</p> <p>10 In any event, you went to the scene?</p> <p>11 <b>A. Correct.</b></p> <p>12 Q. If we can just turn over a tab in the bundle to tab 3.</p> <p>13 For the screen, it is IPC469. We can see that there is</p> <p>14 a log that has been started. I think if we turn over</p> <p>15 the page --</p> <p>16 <b>A. That's correct.</b></p> <p>17 Q. -- we can see that it was started before your arrival.</p> <p>18 <b>A. Yes.</b></p> <p>19 Q. And the first two entries on there no doubt are PCs</p> <p>20 Taylor and Holder?</p> <p>21 <b>A. That would appear so, sir, yes.</b></p> <p>22 Q. If we look at the fourth entry, we see KG1, which is</p> <p>23 a call sign which I think the jury are probably familiar</p> <p>24 with, that is the call sign of the duty inspector?</p> <p>25 <b>A. That is the duty officer's call sign, that is me.</b></p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 14</p>	<p>1 <b>A. I recall they had searched him, found some ID, found</b></p> <p>2 <b>some drug paraphernalia.</b></p> <p>3 Q. Yes. Let me just ask, so they had searched his</p> <p>4 clothing, is that right?</p> <p>5 <b>A. His clothing, yes, his pockets.</b></p> <p>6 Q. As you say, they had found a wallet which had some</p> <p>7 identification in it?</p> <p>8 <b>A. I believe so, I seem to recall being shown a driving</b></p> <p>9 <b>licence.</b></p> <p>10 Q. You mentioned some drugs paraphernalia, would that be</p> <p>11 a syringe I think and also a small bottle of liquid and</p> <p>12 a small bag --</p> <p>13 <b>A. I believe so.</b></p> <p>14 Q. We will come to that.</p> <p>15 Did you actually see those items at the time or can</p> <p>16 you not remember?</p> <p>17 <b>A. I believe I was shown them at the time, I think in</b></p> <p>18 <b>evidence bags.</b></p> <p>19 Q. As we have seen, a log had been started and was there</p> <p>20 a cordon either in place or --</p> <p>21 <b>A. They placed -- started to do a cordon, yes, around the</b></p> <p>22 <b>immediate vicinity.</b></p> <p>23 Q. Once you had had that briefing, did you go over to where</p> <p>24 Jack's body was?</p> <p>25 <b>A. No.</b></p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 16</p>

<p>1 Q. What did do you?</p> <p>2 <b>A. I seem to recall there was a bicycle, Jack was in the</b></p> <p>3 <b>corner or against the wall. Obviously not knowing or</b></p> <p>4 <b>having time to make any assessments around how he came</b></p> <p>5 <b>to be there or what had happened to him, I didn't go too</b></p> <p>6 <b>near -- I can't recall how near I went, but I went close</b></p> <p>7 <b>enough to satisfy myself that, yes, he does from this</b></p> <p>8 <b>distance appear deceased. I can't recall the exact</b></p> <p>9 <b>distance.</b></p> <p>10 Q. Let's just have a look. You will need to look at this</p> <p>11 in the bundle, sergeant, because it will not come up on</p> <p>12 the screen, it is the other bundle in front of you, the</p> <p>13 smaller one. This is jury bundle A and it is tab 15,</p> <p>14 please.</p> <p>15 We see here some photographs of the scene. In fact,</p> <p>16 if you could just turn over to the second page, briefly,</p> <p>17 there are some photographs here of a syringe, a small</p> <p>18 bag and a bottle. The photographs of the bottle, it is</p> <p>19 actually the bottle on the left, which I think the</p> <p>20 evidence shows is the bottle that was found, the one in</p> <p>21 the middle is actually the lab bottle, which the</p> <p>22 contents of the one on the left were put into.</p> <p>23 I mean obviously it has been some time, but do those</p> <p>24 look like the items that you saw at the scene?</p> <p>25 <b>A. I don't know.</b></p> <p style="text-align: center;">Page 17</p>	<p>1 a moment. Particularly the matters that you took into</p> <p>2 account. May I ask you before that, were you aware at</p> <p>3 this stage that, very close to where Jack's body had</p> <p>4 been found, two other bodies had been found the year</p> <p>5 before?</p> <p>6 <b>A. I wasn't -- at the time, I remember, as we say, the</b></p> <p>7 <b>two -- Mr Kovari and Mr Whitworth had been found in</b></p> <p>8 <b>St Margaret's Church, as I recall it, but I didn't</b></p> <p>9 <b>realise until seeing the court graphics just exactly how</b></p> <p>10 <b>close it was.</b></p> <p>11 Q. You remembered that element of their story?</p> <p>12 <b>A. I hadn't on the way there. I think it came up --</b></p> <p>13 <b>I think it might be on the CAD message or in my notes</b></p> <p>14 <b>somewhere or in my statement, that someone called from</b></p> <p>15 <b>the control room and said, "Guv, so you were aware,</b></p> <p>16 <b>there were two deaths last year".</b></p> <p>17 Q. I want to take you to a passage of your statement now.</p> <p>18 In fact, could we have it up on the screen, please.</p> <p>19 IPC393, page 3.</p> <p>20 What I am going to do, you can see it there, I am</p> <p>21 going to read out a paragraph and ask you about it,</p> <p>22 right?</p> <p>23 <b>A.
